Discoverability

ASL and LSQ content is scarce and difficult to find.

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No National Sign Languages Mandate

Canada lacks a regulatory requirement for sign languages programming.

Discoverability Challenges

Difficult to find. Scattered. No central platform. No standardized labelling.



Sign Languages Solution

News Media Access

ASL and LSQ are distinct languages.



DWCC recommends the Commission to:

- 1. To set and regulate a new CRTC TV & Digital Access Code
- 2. Establish a Canadian Sign Languages Broadcasting Fund (CSLBF) of \$10 million annually, modelled on the British Broadcasting Fund (BSLBF)
- 3. Mandate a national sign languages content target of at least 5%, phased in over 10 years
- 4. Initiate and conduct a feasibility study on a Canadian Sign Languages Broadcasting, including an examination of potential contribution mechanisms
